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Chapter One

Author: Adrian Tennant

Level: Starter

Age: Teenagers / adults

Time needed: 30-40 minutes (approx)

Preparation: Photocopy of the worksheet for

each student.

Lead-in (optional)

① Show the students the cover of the book and tell them they will listen to the story called *The Well*. Use the picture on the front cover to elicit (and explain) the meaning of the words *well* and *bucket*.

Ask students what you usually find in a well or put in a bucket and try to elicit water.

3 Finally, ask students where else you can get water and try to elicit *tap*. Alternatively use a picture to elicit the word.

Before listening


1 Put students in pairs and ask them to look at the picture.

Ask them to work together and label the picture with the words in the box.

Obsplay the picture and check the answers together.

Optional extra: Check the pronunciation of each of the words with your students.

While listening: Exercise 1

Ask students to read the nine words.


2 Explain that you will play the first chapter of the story. They should listen and tick the words they hear. If they don't hear the word, they should leave the box empty.

3 Play the recording once.

4 Put students in pairs and have them check together.

Play the recording again if you think it's necessary.

Check the answers as a class.



Answer key:

grandmother, brother, water, husband, sick, bucket

While listening: Exercise 2

Ask students to look at the speech bubbles. Can they remember who said each sentence?

2 Play the recording and ask students to match the sentences to the correct person.

Out students in pairs and get them to check together.

Play the recording again if you think it's necessary.

5 Check the answers as a class.

Answer key:

Grandmother: 'Please go to the well.'

Mother: 'There is no well here, Ma.' and 'Grandmother

is sick.'

Lia doesn't say anything.

Follow-up: Talk about the story

Put students in small groups.

2 Ask them to look at the two questions and discuss what they think.

Monitor and help where necessary.

Ask a few students to say what they think.

Note:

- There are no right or wrong answers here.
 Students are predicting / guessing. They will find out the answer to the first question later in the story.
- At this level students might find it difficult to discuss using only English. Encourage them to use as much English as possible, but if a lively discussion begins in the students' mother tongue, you might want to let it run for a few minutes and then ask them to try and report back their ideas in English.



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Transcript

Grandmother: 'Yes, husband? Oh, it's in the well. It's in a bucket of water. Thank you.'


Lia and her mother are in Grandmother's room. Lia's mother brings some food and water.
